

SENATOR BEUTLER: Question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is whether debate should cease. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay.

CLERK: Senator Beutler voting yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Please vote. Has everybody voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 1 nay to cease debate, Mr. President.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Debate is ceased. Senator Vickers, would you care to close on your amendment? Closing is waived. The motion before you is the adoption of the Vickers amendment to the resolution. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Voting aye, Pat.

CLERK: Senator Beutler voting yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Please vote. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of Senator Vickers' amendment to the resolution, Mr. President.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The amendment is adopted. We are back on the main resolution. Are there any further motions, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Nothing further on the resolution, Mr. President.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Senator Sieck, to address the resolution.

SENATOR SIECK: Mr. President, members of the body, I sort of agree with Senator Johnson that we do spend too much time on an issue like this. But, with the discussion that went on, I think I better bring one more point across. We talk about competing with the soybean industry in South America. Actually we could compete, but the federal government in our country and the world bank is not allowing us to compete because what we are doing...we are giving them money to build a factory to help them process it without interest, without paying it back to us. If we would not do that and compete directly with the country I'm sure that we could do it. But when our country, our federal government causes
