There would be a real doubt in my mind that you can limit anybody to have a check drawn on a Nebraska institution only without getting yourself involved in restraint of trade and all kinds of things.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Warner, are you addressing that question to Senator Vickers?

SENATOR WARNER: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Senator Warner, I don't know about the constitutionality of this. I would be happy to ask for an Attorney General's opinion but it occurs to me that by limiting it only to credit cards we almost have got the same situation. We are saying to an individual that if don't have the cash on you but you happen to have a credit card, which to a degree is almost in some instances similar to a check, that we will accept that but we are not going to accept the check. I guess I have some real problems with that as a matter of philosophy. As to your question as to whether or not we should hold this back until Select File, you know, anything that this body puts on on General File can always be taken off on Select File, and as you well know, it only takes 25 votes to do either one. I would be much more happy to put it on and then ask that question of the Attorney General, and if there is any problems with it, why attempt to work out those problems on Select File.
