PRESIDENT: Is there further discussion on the issue of germaneness? Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: No, not the germaneness, no.

PRESIDENT: Okay.

SENATOR GOODRICH: But I want to...

PRESIDENT: We'll take up your other point if...

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp has had his say. Is there any further discussion on the germaneness? The Chair is ready to rule. The Chair rules that it is outside the scope of the bill, it is not germane. And that ruling may be overruled if you wish. Anything further on the bill, Mr...oh, we're still considering the amendment.

SENATOR DECAMP: Is it germane? Do you think it's germane?

PRESIDENT: I say tomatoes, you say "tomahtoos".

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.
