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and I have absolutely no objection to that. I'm sure it makes the young people feel very happy. The reason I pointed out this is during my recent re-election campaign my opponent sent out fliers telling people that Senator Higgins was late to work so many times and I want the people to know that are listening that I was late because I was always down in my office working with my staff, returning calls to constituents, dictating letters because I did not feel that the resolutions that the various senators wanted to adopt congratulating their home teams were as important as my returning calls and messages and letters to my constituents. And I just wanted to take this opportunity to refute the distorted campaign message that C. Bruce Davis, in Omaha, put out about me. And now that we have finished with these resolutions, I hope the people who are watching at home on cable TV will understand why Senator Higgins was late so many times, only because I do not spend time on resolutions unless they are constitutional resolutions or resolutions for senators who have lost a member of their family and that type. But I have no objection to the senators offering these resolutions in order to support their home town teams. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Okay, Senator Higgins. Members, may we have your attention please. The Clerk is going to go through the consent calendar list and announce the bills that have been stricken from the list so please pay attention.

CLERK: Mr. President, the first bill, LB 415 has been removed; LB...these are in the order as they appear in your agenda incidentally, LB 415 was removed; LB 215 has been removed; LB 691 which is towards the bottom of your agenda has been removed; LB 153 has been removed. Turning to the back side, LB 626 has been removed; LB 298 has been removed and LB 553 has been removed, Mr. President. That's all that I have at this point. Oh, I have one more, Mr. President. LB 384 which is towards the very bottom of the first page, Mr. President, has been removed.

PRESIDENT: Very well. We will proceed to consent calendar and if you will note that the rules on this is that the total debate on each bill is to be not more than 15 minutes and if there is no motion pending to dispose of the bill one way or the other at that time, it just stays on General File, I think. The usual introducer, first speaker's time on a consent calendar bill is ten minutes. Speaking time is
