

PRESIDENT: He is not in the room.

SENATOR ABOUD: Okay.

PRESIDENT: Senator Landis, if you are within hearing...

SENATOR ABOUD: I can probably just handle it. It was a rather...

PRESIDENT: Very good.

SENATOR ABOUD: It was a rather simple bill that we heard in the Government Committee. It was the result of a case that Judge Van Pelt had that ruled our present statute as unconstitutional and Secretary of State, Allen Beermann, came to the committee and said that we should have some statute on the books since our present law was unconstitutional. And what this bill is following the guidelines that were the results of the case that was held before Judge Van Pelt. I would move its advancement.

PRESIDENT: Senator Haberman, do you wish to speak on this? Your light is on. Any further discussion then on LB 424? If not, the motion is to advance the bill from General File. All those in favor vote yes, opposed vote no. Please record your vote on the advancement of LB 424. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: Mr. President, 29 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance LB 424.

PRESIDENT: 424 advances. LB 356.

CLERK: 356, Mr. President, was a bill that was introduced by Senator Richard Peterson. (Read title.) It was first read on January 18, referred to Public Works, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Peterson.
