

SENATOR LAMB: That is correct.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Rod Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: I have a question for Senator Lamb if he would yield just briefly. Yes, Senator Lamb, this is very similar to what Class VI's do with their feeder schools, is that not right?

SENATOR LAMB: It is quite similar, not exactly the same.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Okay, that is what I wanted to know.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Remmers, then Senator Scofield.

SENATOR REMMERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I would like to direct a question to Senator Lamb.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Lamb, please.

SENATOR REMMERS: Senator Lamb, in this situation, the accepting school district would furnish transportation for high school students?

SENATOR LAMB: No, there is a provision in there that there would be no transportation at all and the mill levy which the receiving district would set for high school does not include transportation, any of the transportation. We are separating out transportation making it similar to a Class VI in that the receiving district would not be obligated for any transportation. And on the other hand their levy which they charge does not cover their transportation costs which they have for their other students.

SENATOR REMMERS: So then the cost would be based on their annual report to what they had in their breakdown as to what does high school cost and what does elementary cost.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, sir.
