

political body across the line sending you a bill for services rendered. Now that may sound like a difference without a distinction but I think under the law it is an important difference.

SENATOR REMMERS: Well, you are the lawyer. I wouldn't know but it seems to me like there is very little difference but thank you.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Senator Remmers, I think in fact there is very little difference. I won't argue with that but the method I think makes it unconstitutional or at least, I mean I haven't researched this issue and any lawyer is a fool that gives an opinion without researching it, but it certainly sends off red flags in my mind as to a way of making this bill defective.

SENATOR REMMERS: Thank you.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Lynch is next. However, may I introduce some guests of all of us senators, I guess. There are 80 women with the Nebraska Federation of Women's Clubs with us with their State President and State Legislative Chairman and they are in both balconies. Will you please stand and be recognized. Thank you for visiting the Legislature. Senator Lynch, please.

SENATOR LYNCH: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, there are some other examples of where people are governed but not able to vote for those people who regulate their lives. For example, if you live around a metropolitan size city of any sort, smaller city of any sort, where planning and zoning exists, they sometimes have what is called the half mile limits, and mile limits, and three mile limits. It has been determined that for jurisdiction purposes and for orderly growth, the people that live in those areas should be regulated by those zoning ordinances as it involves the construction of roads, bridges, houses, streets, subdivisions, et cetera. So there are more examples of how people can be regulated by jurisdictions for which they do not have the right to vote. As we sit and talk about 662, especially this amendment, I felt obliged to stand up and mention that. When I introduced my legislation which seems at this point in this discussion on 662 probably the best approach, one single taxing unit per county made more sense as I look at it and
