SPEAKER NICHOL: My, such politeness.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Right. Mr. President and members of the body, this is probably an unusual issue for me to be standing here discussing with you this morning but since I am on the Miscellaneous Subjects I feel that it is important for me to say just a few words in regards to Senator Chambers' attempt for reconsideration. I think one of the things that we are asked to do in this legislative body is be selective, to be able to discern between the issues as to how they are alike and how they are different. In the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee we do that. In every other committee you do that. Maybe all of the issues are agriculture, or maybe all of the issues are education, but nevertheless there is a difference. And we need to recognize the differences and address those differences independently. Gambling is not all gambling. If we are going to say in the Constitution that, yes, we accept certain things but we are going to hide our heads and the others will go away, maybe if we just put our eyes...our hands over our eyes or our hands over our ears, maybe they will go away or maybe we won't have to think about them. And I am saying that if you lump all gambling together, you are not going to make it go away. And bookmaking is not going to go away. The Constitution may prohibit legalized bookmaking but does it prohibit illegalized? I think that you must give Senator Chambers...I don't say you must because, obviously, you don't "must" do anything in here, but I am asking that you do give him a fair shot to explain the differences in this. I feel that there are differences. I have gone back to my communities. I have talked to my bookies. Maybe you don't know who the bookies are in your community, but through a matter of selectivity you can find out the names of those bookies and they will share certain information with you. They will openly tell you. When Senator Chambers talked about \$40,000 out of the community, he is talking about my community and I tell you that I was a little surprised in some respects but they are not going to go away. They are going to continue to operate. And if the federal government has recognized this and the federal government is taxing this, then I think we need to take another look at this issue and we are not going to take a look at it if we don't have the opportunity to discuss it.
