SENATOR HIGGINS: So in order to get this bill funded, you want to go back retroactive to January 1 of '84?

SENATOR WESELY: No, '85, of this year.

SENATOR HIGGINS: If you read the amendment, it says January 1, '84.

SENATOR WESELY: It is January 1, '85, isn't it?

SENATOR HIGGINS: Did you read the amendment?

SENATOR WESELY: It is '85. Oh, that is right, okay, we have got to go back to the last fiscal year, so it would be '84. The money has already been collected and is in the fund. What we are doing is just going retroactive.

SENATOR HIGGINS: What I am getting at is you are going back to January 1 of '84 and asking those fees be used to fund this bill...

SENATOR WESELY: Yes.

SENATOR HIGGINS: ...when the fees were originally intended to fund the Health Department and the other people that have to make the inspections of these people licensed?

SENATOR WESELY: That is right.

SENATOR HIGGINS: So eventually it is going to affect somebody's budget.

SENATOR WESELY: I guess you could say that. Yeah, it will be (interruption).

SENATOR HIGGINS: I guess that is what it is really going to do. Thank you, Senator Wesely. This sounds like a very complicated amendment. You are going back to 1984 retroactively and you are taking money out of people's funds and you are saying it is not going to raise taxes, they have got more money than they need in the funds but they never lower the fees. This is kind of new to me that you go back retroactively and take somebody's money and put it someplace
