

profession shall mean any profession providing health services or health care."

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. Members, I hope you will look at Section 10. It is giving a definition. Oh, Senator Wesely says Section 10 has already been stricken. Let us put our heads together a second. I don't know if what he offered is better but in order to look at it and analyze it I am going to withdraw that amendment so that I can try to see what impact it has on other things that I was looking at in connection with it.

SPEAKER NICHOL: So ordered. Do you have anything else on the bill, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to strike Section 2 of the bill.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wesely, you may want to look at this. This is where I would try to remove all of the intent language found in Section 2, and since I have discussed it before, there won't be any need for me to go into great detail on that. However, I should call some things to your attention before you vote, as you probably, will with Senator DeCamp to cut off additional discussion on this well-lobbied, greased bill. If you turn to page 6, and the lawyers should be interested but I know they won't because it won't put any money in their pocket or take it out but they should look at this. Starting in line 22, you will find new language, "When existing common law and statutory civil actions and criminal prohibitions are not sufficient to eradicate existing harm, the regulations shall provide for stricter civil actions and criminal prosecutions;". You mean to tell me that the...oh, that has been stricken, too? On page 6, lines 22 through 25, has that already been stricken? Okay, this is still in but it shouldn't be. How are you going to determine today that if something is going to be considered a Class I misdemeanor, whoever deals with it in the future should make it a Class III felony? How can you order a Legislature to impose harsher punishments if it decides that current law is adequate to do the job. Maybe the Legislature does not want to impose punishment by making it criminal at all. Maybe it would feel that it is sufficient to revoke a license but these health care
