

SENATOR LABEDZ: One minute, Senator.

SENATOR DECAMP: ...on every poll that's been done, that's where the hurt is. Now if you have a limited amount of medicine, a limited amount of medicine, at least for God's sake, treat those, the majority of which the average person you can do the most good for. I agree with Senator Schmit and Senator Carsten. It's going to take another 250 or \$300 million to get the whole job done, maybe up to \$500 million, but with your first million at least give the vast bulk, the 300,000 homeowners and the vast bulk of small or average farmers also come out just as good, give them something they really feel beneficially, a 25 percent reduction in their property taxes. That's what you can accomplish with this amendment. I urge you to adopt the amendment. With Senator Schmit's arguments about I don't know anything about land or actual value or the various other things I don't know, yeah, maybe he's right, who knows.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Time is up. We're voting on Senator DeCamp's amendment. All those in favor vote aye...yes, Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Am I correct in assuming that this takes just a majority, a simple majority?

SENATOR LABEDZ: It's an amendment to the committee amendment, it's a simple majority

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you.

SENATOR LABEDZ: We're voting on Senator DeCamp's amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay.

CLERK: Senator Labeledz voting yes.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Senator DeCamp requested a roll call vote. Call the roll.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken as found on page 1107 of the Legislative Journal.) 20 ayes, 26 nays on adoption of the amendment.
