

to harm another. That is clearly the situation we are talking about here. Again, the penalty for this is a Class II misdemeanor, which can mean time in prison and a severe fine, not just a \$100 fine. Again, I think you are more likely to get a prosecutor to handle something like that where he has something of significance to prosecute than you are an infraction. You know we've had some discussions and I think all of you are aware of the problem of traffic tickets, parking tickets and things, piling up in Lincoln and Omaha. The reason that they are piling up is because everybody knows that they are not very well enforced. So what happens under an infraction system, unless you are willing to go out and do the enforcement and get heavily involved in an enforcement is that everybody finds out that nothing happens, so it has no effect. So right now we are coming back in with a bill in the Legislature to suggest that you lose your driver's license if you don't pay your parking tickets. I suggest to you that that bill will probably pass because the present system doesn't work. Yet what is being suggested to you today is that we go through this experience again. We don't learn from our experiences, do we? Thank you.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Chambers, please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, my seatmate, Senator Beutler, was methodical, logical, reasonable, accurate and correct. When you have that much going for you in the Legislature on an argument, you are bound to lose.
