

SPEAKER NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I would not have voted to advance in the form that it was in.

SPEAKER NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If the rest of the committee members...and I understand that vote was seven to nothing or whatever it was that sent it out here, had done all of this looking at the bill as they should have done, they shouldn't have voted to bring it back. I am the bad guy who always says in committee and out here on the floor, you don't read these bills, you don't do your work and you get embarrassed and they bring them back. And I don't know whether Senator Higgins' bill will get out or not. If it stays the way it is and I have anything to do about it, it won't get out. But remember I am only one. The others will bow to pressure. Senator Higgins, you just turn that flame up a notch or two higher and your bill will come out of here if they feel it is the most atrocious thing that ever passed, but it will have one vote against it.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Time is up. Senator Pirsch, please. The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 1 nay to cease debate, Mr. President.

I would like to lose one of those arguments with him. But I do want to talk about the repose issue but I don't want to do it today. I would suggest to Senator Chambers that we will have a very good lively debate on whether this is a statute of repose issue, when the accrual time starts for a claim and what the effects are with regard to statute of limitations.
