Thank you. Their teacher is Virginia Murphy. Thank you for visiting the Legislature. We will move on to Final Reading now and an explanation to the students that are here. The law is that all...the Constitution says that all bills must be read entirely in their final form when they come down to a vote. So we have about fifteen bills starting now that you will be hearing a mumble by the Clerk that he reads so fast you can't understand it, but if you slow it down, you could understand it and they do read all of the words. But this is a constitutional necessity which the Legislature has attempted to change from time to time. So about the next hour and a half you will not be hearing any discussion or debate on the floor, simply the mumbling of the Clerk. We are sorry you came in at this time but that is the way it is sometime. Mr. Clerk, we will go on...do you have anything to read in before we continue on?

CLERK: Yes, sir. Mr. President, your committee on Public Health reports 674 to General File with amendments. (See page 1268 of the Legislative Journal.)

LB 148 is reported indefinitely postponed by Public Works, as is 697.

Senator Vickers would like to print amendments to 457 and 379. (See pages 1268-69 of the Legislative Journal.)

The Executive Board reports 369 indefinitely postponed; 694 indefinitely postponed. Those are signed by the respective Chairs.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Okay, we will continue on to Final Reading. Would you please return to your seats. Unauthorized personnel please leave the floor and members of the Legislature please return to your seats. As soon as you have returned to your seats we will begin Final Reading. Begin, Mr. Clerk, please. Thank you.
