

SENATOR DECAMP: No, no, this would be the public officials, the public officials. And as I say, I don't know whether it would be the county board or whether it would be the city council and the mayor because I don't know...

SENATOR HARTNETT: It's not in the City of Omaha.

SENATOR DECAMP: Okay, then I'm sure it would be Douglas County officials.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Thank you.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Withem. Senator Withem, yes.

SENATOR WITHEM: Mr. President, members of the body, I also have a question of Senator DeCamp if he would respond.

SENATOR DECAMP: Yeah.

SENATOR WITHEM: I was trying to read through the bill so I wouldn't have to bother you with a question on the floor and I couldn't quite interpret from the bill the answer to my question. The local option, do they...is it a yes or a no situation for the entire county or for the entire city or by, if we'd adopt your amendment, would the Douglas County Board of Commissioners have the option of saying, yes, Ak-Sar-Ben can have liquor sales after twelve, but, no, some bar in western Douglas County could not, or does it have to be one rule that is consistent for the entire county?

SENATOR DECAMP: This is an off the top of the head legal opinion. I'm sure you can't have one rule for one and one rule on another, so I'm sure it would have to be uniform rule. That's the off the top of the head, however, I'll give you the rebuttal to that. At the present time you already have in Lincoln I know and a whole bunch of other places hard liquor from twelve o'clock on on Sunday. I know for sure because...well, almost every Sunday I see people go to the Legion Club and I know the Legion Club sells hard liquor on Sunday in Lincoln. In fact, it's the fullest place in Lincoln on Sunday so maybe they have a different class of license that doesn't fall under those rules or not. I'm going to guess that's it. They probably have a club license, but I've got to think the rule, if it was a Class C license that the Ak-Sar-Ben had, then all Class C people
