By the same token, there are counterarguments that you have too much overhead and you can have efficiencies of scale in just being small. I guess it's a matter of opinion. That's what the...it's turned it into a free enterprise system, competitive system, as opposed to the previous system, but it doesn't really matter whether we do it or not. The court has ordered it. SENATOR DECAMP: Have to make it available. But...okay.
