

SENATOR WESELY: We can't live with that deletion, Senator DeCamp.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Okay, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Members of the Legislature, this letter from Judge Gradwohl says, the only sentence in the bill which makes any difference at all is the last sentence in this particular section. All of the other provisions in the bill merely involve present rules and practices so if you deleted the sentence, you have, in fact, killed the bill anyway. So I won't attempt to amend it.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right. Senator DeCamp, did you want to finish?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, I will show myself as not voting for purposes of reconsideration should that be necessary.

SENATOR DECAMP: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then I don't have to say it later.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right.

SENATOR DECAMP: Then let me complete my closing, Mr. President. And I am trying to simplify the issue a little bit so you understand it.

SPEAKER NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR DECAMP: And I guess I am going to have to do it doggone quick. First of all, Judge Gradwohl's letter. Judge Gradwohl proves my case. The only sentence that makes any difference is the last sentence which is different than the NLRB, NLRA definition which means the case law doesn't apply again. Now Nebraska has its own definition which they contended, the supporters of this bill, contended we don't even have a definition or it is unclear. Read Judge Gradwohl's letter. Judge Gradwohl's letter says, hey, it is clear as a bell, has been since 1971. The very one they are quoting is the one claiming it is clear, that we have no problem with it. Let me give you a little bit of additional information, and Judge Gradwohl is a good friend of mine. I
