

with rural letter carriers. We are going to be given the opportunity to make a statement of intent about all the pressure we are getting from the automobile manufacturers. We're going to get to vote on an amendment that allows someone who is caught by a police officer wearing a belt to get a little credit token that he can then use if he is caught without a belt, to have that arrest nullified. And we are going to get other amendments in that vein. Now I would urge you, colleagues, particularly those of you who are against the bill, that we've got better things to do than to sit around here, and a bill that clearly has the votes that it is going to take to advance, and discuss this kind of nonsense. I mean I'm tired of it. I think all of us are getting tired of it. We've been doing it for six hours. I think we ought to bring it to a vote today, because if we don't bring it to a vote today why then we're going to spend another two, or three, or four hours on it on Select File tomorrow or Thursday of this week, or Friday of this week, whatever the day after that is. So, anyway, I would urge you to support this amendment to suspend the rules so we can bring this bill to a vote this afternoon before we adjourn. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator John DeCamp, please.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, I just got a thought here. Senator Chambers, you have some motions up. You ready to take a vote on it? Senator Chambers says he's ready to withdraw. What else is up there? We can spend an hour debating suspending the rules, or we can get everybody to withdraw things here in 30 seconds and get a vote.
