SENATOR VICKERS: Yes or no, Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: No.

SENATOR VICKERS: Okay, thank you. Senator Schmit, could I get you to respond to that question as well, if Senator Chizek would quit talking to you for just a minute. Senator Schmit, would you support a bill next year to repeal the "right to work" laws in this state? Please, yes or no.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Well, Senato., I would probably follow your leadership, but sometimes you bring out the best in me. I don't know if I could or not.

SENATOR VICKERS: Okay, thank you. Well, Mr. President, the reason I am raising these questions, asking these questions is because if we are going to have forced unionism in agriculture, then I think it is only fair to have forced unionism in the rest of the labor force as well.
