

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right, thank you. We're voting on the adoption of the Lundy amendment, for those of you who were out. Senator Nelson, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR NELSON: Yes, I wonder, there were quite a few people off the floor. I wonder if you would read the Lundy amendment. I don't know as they know what we are voting on.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Mr. Clerk, could you tell them briefly what Senator Lundy's amendment is.

CLERK: Mr. President, I'll be happy to read Senator Lundy's amendment. (Read Lundy amendment found on page 1526 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: Does that tell you what it is? Begin the roll call, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 1526 of the Legislative Journal.) 23 ayes, 15 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The motion fails. Do you have anything else?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hoagland would then move to amend. (See Hoagland amendment on page 1526 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Hoagland, please. Senator Hoagland. Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Mr. Speaker and colleagues, let me just discuss this amendment briefly because I don't think we need to take a lot of time on it. This amendment simply limits the DeCamp amendment to cities of the metropolitan class. If the need for this is so Ak-Sar-Ben can conduct its Sunday races, this would allow them to do that, but it would not impose this change anywhere else in the state. I think it speaks for itself. I ask for your adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator DeCamp, please. Senator DeCamp.
