

SENATOR DECAMP: Well, I want to turn in the right amendment, which I thought had been done to you already, which obviously hasn't. Is this it? We just got it from the bill drafter. It will be turned in immediately.

SPEAKER NICHOL: I understand on LB 97, Senator Schmit has an amendment to his own bill and he is not here. So we'll pass over 97. We've taken care of 250A. Senator Scofield, are you ready on 279?

SENATOR SCOFIELD: (Response inaudible.)

CLERK: Mr. President, then on 279, the first item I have are E & R amendments to the bill.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Okay. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. President, I move that the amendments be adopted.

SPEAKER NICHOL: You've heard the motion. All in favor say aye. Opposed nay. They are adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, I would then have an amendment from Senators Scofield and Hannibal. That amendment is on page 1374 of the Journal.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Okay. Senator Hannibal, are you going to handle that amendment? Okay.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Mr. Speaker and members, this is a friendly amendment that Senator Scofield and I have come together on. Basically it is kind of an omission in the bill. It was dealing with the percent of products that you could bring in from outside the State of Nebraska for the purposes of making wine. What this amendment does is it says that that can happen under these conditions only in the case of a natural disaster, which basically mean like if your crop is wiped out in the middle of your production year. Otherwise, all the other provisions of the bill stay in force. It is better if you are looking for economic development in the state, for the state. I would urge its adoption.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Scofield, do you want to talk to a friendly amendment for a change?
