

belts all over the country but that is not going to happen and we know why. There are political ramifications again. David Landis brought up a very good point and I think he raised the equal protection question. Some belts are seeable, others are not. So some people are going to be set upon, others not. Some will be suspected of a violation of the law when in fact they are in compliance. If you have on a lap belt, a cop could stop you and say, well, I thought you were in violation. So if you can be in complete accord with the law but stopped as though you are violating the law, I think something is wrong with a law like that and we are not requiring the shoulder harnesses, and those are not in all these older cars that are going to be covered by this bill. Now I have got to go to Senator Goll. Not often am I trumped on this floor. I am often tromped upon, that is t-r-o-m-p-e-d, but not often trumped, t-r-u-m-p-e-d. Senator Goll almost got me this morning when he mentioned the Tin Lizzie, made me think about something. There is an elected female official in England who holds the highest elected position in that country. She being...she can command battleships, airplanes, cannons, soldiers, sailors, she can bash workers. She can do some awesome things so they call her the "Iron Lady". We have an appointed functionary in this country who can weaken bumpers, who can try to prevent air bags and other state of the art safety equipment, so such being the case, Senator Goll, the appropriate title for her is "Tin Lizzie".

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: As far as these seat belts go, period, they say every person shall wear one. It doesn't say shall wear one in the fashion intended by those who designed the belts. Then when it gets to the condition of this belt, it said "adjusted, properly adjusted and fastened." Never properly worn so you can adjust the belt, you can fasten it, and you can wear it on your arm if you want to. If you have got a lap belt, you can wear it on one leg if you want to. Just so you have got a belt on your body somewhere, that is all the law requires. This is a good law? Taking people's freedom away and Senator Morehead has not even made them draft a good bill to do it. Remember, though, this amendment that I am suggesting does only one thing. It puts off the effective date of this bill to September 1, 1989, and gives other legislatures the opportunity to sell their people...well, to give the interest of their people up to
