SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you very much. Thank you very much, Senator Marsh. You answered my question. Therefore, I think Senator Chambers has a good amendment. I don't see how we can justify taking points off on seat belts and not taking the points off for not having a child buckled up in their seat restraint. Now I have a motion up there, and I am going to tell you about it because we may not get to it. I have a motion that we have seat belts in school buses. Now I tried this once and it didn't go too well, but I stumbled across some testimony of Senator Marsh which told me that...

PRESIDENT: Senator, what is your...

SENATOR MARSH: Is Senator Haberman speaking to his amendment or is he speaking to the issue before us?

PRESIDENT: That is up to the Senator to answer. Yes, he is using his time. Go ahead, Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Marsh testified on the floor that it will be valuable to protect (interruption).

SENATOR MARSH: What are you speaking to, Senator Haberman?

SENATOR HABERMAN: (Interruption) ...those small Nebraskans who are capable of not making decisions for their own safety. We know that it is impossible for an adult to safety restrain a child in the arms of a crash situation.
