

SENATOR MARSH: Mr. President, point of order.

PRESIDENT: Senator Beutler, did you wish to speak on the amendment?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I wish to call the question, Mr. Speaker.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease on the motion? All those in favor vote yes, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion prevails. Senator Chambers, you may close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, people are getting testy now but it shows the seriousness of the issue really and it is nothing in this room compared to what the people out there will have in the way of reaction when this atrocious thing begins to be enforced upon them.
