

which occurs when political motivation rather than a pure concern for the safety of the public is involved. There wouldn't be an insistence that somebody lose points because they are not wearing a seat belt, but now people feel they have been pushed into a corner so they have got to be opposed to every amendment except the ones they offer. And if they offer one that I saw, it is going to be unconstitutional. I am not going to tell you why. There is something else in this bill that is unconstitutional and I have talked to Governor Kerrey about it and I have suggested he take consultation with the Attorney General and see whether such is the case. And then see if he wants to sign such a bill. But there are steps that could have been taken, if you insisted on passing this bill, to bring about a degree of equity. I hope that on this amendment you bring the bill back and add the words which simply say that no points will be assessed against the license of anybody convicted under this proposition. That is the amendment. I hope you will bring the bill back and adopt it.

PRESIDENT: The motion before you is that of Senator Chambers to return the bill to Select File for a specific amendment. All those in favor vote yes, opposed vote no. Ten seconds to record your vote. Please record your vote. Have you all voted? The Clerk will record the vote. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: May we check in and then I will have a roll call.

PRESIDENT: Members, please check in and show your presence on the Board. We are on Final Reading. Eight members are excused at the present time. All members not excused, please record your presence. Senator Nichol, please. Senator Hoagland, Senator Hartnett. Senator Hannibal. Senator Marsh, would you record your presence. Senator Hannibal and Senator Wesely, please come to the Chamber. We are on Final Reading. Senator Wesely. Will the Sergeant check about Senator Wesely. Senator Sieck, there we are. Senator Wesely, please. We can proceed according to the Senator. Unless there is objection, we will proceed with a roll call vote. Go ahead, Mr. Clerk.
