PRESIDENT: All right, the proper time to make the motion is at the beginning of a man's use of time.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So I am starting my time and I call the question.

PRESIDENT: You don't have time right now. You relinquished it.

SENATOR HABERMAN: No. No, I didn't.

PRESIDENT: Senator Pappas did not choose to speak. You are not in order now.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I was speaking on Senator Pappas's time.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nichol. Senator Nichol, did you ask the magic one?

SPEAKER NICHOL: Yes.

PRESIDENT: All right. The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall the debate cease on this motion? All those in favor vote yes, opposed vote no. Please record your vote on the motion to cease debate. Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 4 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion prevails and, Senator Hefner, you may close.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, I move the adoption of this amendment. This amendment is very simple. I don't think it is near as complicated as some of my colleagues have indicated. This amendment would exempt a person making frequent delivery stops from exiting from the vehicle such as but not limited to rural letter carriers of the United States Postal Services. The intent of this amendment is to cover those that make frequent stops, and like I indicated in my opening, one example would be those who...those persons that deliver the daily newspapers to boxes along a route in town or in the country, as long as they are making frequent stops. And so at this time I move that we adopt the amendment.

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
