SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President. I just want to read into the record what LB 606, if this amendment is adopted, would do. LB 606, in its form now, its original form is a relatively minor bill dealing with the central registry, the central indexing system. These are the things this amendment would do--it would incorporate the changes that are in LB 603, as amended by the Banking Committee, which would clarify some confusion concerning the county of the debtors residence for filing purposes, and it would also amend several filing fees to conform with LB 808 which was passed last year, which were overlooked in that legislation. It would also incorporate all of the changes proposed in LB 604 which would require county clerks and registers of deeds to transmit certain information from their files to the Secretary of State's Office to be placed in the computerized index. Additionally, most important it would change the whole system of double jeopardy, as it is called whether
