SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Pappas.

SENATOR PAPPAS: Mr. Speaker, colleagues, the amendment I have, what it actually does is require that buyers of farm products post, at the point of delivery or unloading and the point of where they pick the check up, a poster in public view that explains the context of this bill for one year at a time, from the time the bill goes into effect, for one year's period. That affords all the people in the agricultural community, plus the buyer, sellers, etc. to understand that there is a penalty involved, understand that it is required, so everybody can, basically, live under the same rule. I ask for the adoption of this amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, in view of the explanation that Senator Pappas's amendment would require, I have to ask Senator DeCamp a question about his amendment that I didn't get the opportunity to ask because it is a question of maybe general law, Senator DeCamp, that I'd like to have the answer to. You injected Mr. Rex into the discussion for use as an example. So let's assume that in addition to being a liar he is a thief.

SENATOR DECAMP: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Suppose he stole the grain.

SENATOR DECAMP: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And signs the paper saying that it is his. If you, the buyer, buy that grain, do you take good title to it?

SENATOR DECAMP: My answer is if you bought it without any actual notice, of course, you are assuming that I assume, right?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, no complicity...
