Anyway, I guess I'm not quite as keen on some of those pointers as his. My point is this. The bill started out with weeds, the Class I system for reorganization. I freely acknowledge that. I think with the various amendments have made it easy in the future, in the next five legislative sessions and in the court systems, to separate out the weeds. They had their weed patch there. I saw good ground. I went and planted some wheat. My wheat is there now. It's harvest time. The wheat is so much more valuable than the weeds, that I think it would be foolish to miss the opportunity for the harvest. And so if it's necessary, yeah. If it's absolutely necessary I'll vote for the bill, irrespective of the consequences and I full well know, I full well know in my particular situation what the consequences will be. You'll probably be talking to somebody other than me in future years here. But I'm doing it because I really think and I think you know, a lot of you in here, that it is the time, it's here now. What was that fellow in the White House said...no, no, there was another one, if not now, when? If not us, who? This is it. This is the time. The refinancing of education is possible now. What the Governor will do I have no idea. I suspect he's as scared, worried about this vote and what is going to happen as I am about what's going to happen to me.
