

and they want to stay that way. Now let's go a step further. The resolution does not mention, it does not mention those countries that are working towards these weapons which is Iraq and Argentina; completely ignores that. There are four countries that are suspected of having nuclear weapons, India, Israel, Iran and of all the countries in the world to have it, Libya. What happens if they get it? But the resolution is silent. It is absolutely silent on these other countries, so I can tell you now I am going to have six amendments to this resolution and everyone of them is going to be a separate resolution to include those countries that are working towards nuclear weapons and are suspects of having nuclear weapons, because if we are going to do this, let's go all the way and have it mean something and do something. This resolution, furthermore, will have no effect whatsoever on Washington, D. C. or on the Russians. And here we are, 49 of us, imposing our will and we are saying Nebraska feels that we should have this.

SPEAKER NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR HABERMAN: We don't know that Nebraska feels that way. I don't think the resolution is proper. I don't think it is worded proper. I think we are looking at the thing from the wrong aspect, and as far as I am concerned, we should not pass the resolution and I intend to vigorously fight it. Thank you, Mr. President.
