

of Defense, and members of Congress, but in this resolution this morning, and this is why I don't think that Senator Chambers is too serious, but if you look at part 3 of this resolution, we just say that a copy of this resolution will be transmitted, will be transmitted to the President, to President Reagan, to the Secretary of State, and just to each member of the Nebraska Congressional Delegation. He doesn't think it is important enough to send it to all the members of the Congressional Delegation. So, Senator Chambers, I don't believe that you are really serious. You are not certifying this resolution and you are not sending it to all members of Congress, and maybe you could talk about that in your closing, if you would please. I believe that Senator Chambers is trying to embarrass our President and I don't like to do that. In your resolution, Senator Chambers, you say that President Reagan's visit will be wrongly perceived by the rest of the world as American support for pardoning unpunished Nazi war crimes, and many times, many times we are wrongly criticized in this body, but that doesn't keep us from doing it or from passing a law or from passing a resolution. Besides what you may think is wrong, Senator Chambers, I and some other members of this body may think it is right or vice versa. We have many different views in this Legislature and, Senator Chambers, I believe this is just like pushing a wet noodle. It won't accomplish anything. It is a waste of time. It won't even be worth the paper that it is written on. So I would urge you to vote against this resolution this morning.
