SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator John DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, I'd like to ask some questions of Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Certainly.

SENATOR DECAMP: Senator Hefner, you've expressed the happiness that LB 144, in other words, video controls taxing mechanism, was not put into the bill. As Chairman of the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee and as one interested in the subject, and as a marketer, of course, of pickle cards yourself, do you have anything going on or any study going on as to how much video lottery activity, if any, exists and what efforts are being made to enforce the bans against video lottery and to get them out of existence? Do they exist in the state, do you know?

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator DeCamp, I do not know whether they exist in the state. The Legislature passes the laws, and at the present time video slots, I believe, are outlawed in the state. So I think that this would be up to the executive branch of government to enforce. I would suggest that you contact the Attorney General's Office and have them make an investigation of those that are going on.

SENATOR DECAMP: Okay, so then you would support, I assume, and assist in strict enforcement, using the Attorney General, and if necessary, impeachment or other procedures of local county officials who are not enforcing the laws against video slots. Is that correct?

SENATOR HEFNER: That is correct.

SENATOR DECAMP: Okay, then would it be possible for me and you to get together relative to making possibly a resolution of this Legislature to be presented asking for strict enforcement, and if necessary reciting 10 or 20 specific places or institutions that are currently engaging in video
