SENATOR BEUTLER: Your time is up, Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: I oppose the Warner amendment. It does not...it cannot co-exist with the theory in 271 and make sense.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Warner, you are recognized for closing on your amendment.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I will repeat one more time the basis that would be used is not different than what they had currently done. I'll repeat, my sole, prime interest is to maintain that standard. I appreciate that the requirement by statute is there, but everyone knows full well it would only be a matter, at least I believe it would only be a matter of time before there will be an amendment to some bill or some bill introduced to abolish keeping all those records that are not used. I think unless there is some reference to the historic market value to agricultural land so that you can make reasonable judgements as to the impact of Amendment 4 within a taxing district, that in the future it will be perceived to be something other than what it is because I don't think that data base is going to be maintained, even though I acknowledge that the statute will be there, or is there now. But neither do I believe that it will be maintained, so I would urge you to adopt the amendment for that purpose.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The motion before the body is the adoption of the Warner amendment to the committee amendments. Simple majority. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay.

CLERK: Senator Beutler voting no.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Please vote. Please vote. Has everyone voted who wishes to vote? Senator Warner, I'm about to call for the recording of the vote. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 12 ayes, 16 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The amendment is not adopted. Mr. Clerk,
