

have soft corn at the end of the season because it freezes too early, like the early part of September or the latter part of August, at which time there is no yield to the corn because you can't shell it off the cob when it is stuck on there green. So what they do, of course, is to feed it in the condition it is in to cattle, usually, to try to make ends meet and to salvage something out of that corn. How is that production counted in your formula?

SENATOR LANDIS: Again, the same factor, the yield factor varies. Recall if you will, it is a five-year moving average and if there is a down-turn year, it will show up in those five years.

SPEAKER NICHOL: It can't be shown as yield because it goes into cows to attempt to...and you don't show anything in the formula for cows.

SENATOR LANDIS: Right, so it will be deducted from the yield from the land.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Thirty seconds.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Entirely? Somewhat?

SENATOR LANDIS: Yes. If you don't have a yield that sells, you are not looking at the yield of the land. It depends how the farmer chooses to report it for LCSR figures, but I don't believe so.
