

you have an amendment up there that didn't clean it up the way you originally had it.

PRESIDENT: The Clerk needs some clarification, just a moment, please. Senator Marsh is going to refer to an amendment on page 1599 of the Journal. Senator Marsh

SENATOR MARSH: I will ask...thank you, Mr. President, I will ask the body to turn to page 7 of the white copy. On lines 6 through 9, this is referring to the homeowners and what I would like to strike is, "and that if you are selling your own home you may want to request a signed receipt from the buyer and his or her spouse, if applicable, stating that such person has received the statement of rights". We are saying in effect that if the person is selling his or her own home they are not required to do this and it just cleans the language up and we'll do it on this one amendment instead of the two. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Higgins.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Mr. President, I would like to ask the Clerk, is Senator Marsh's amendment now drawn properly so that it would take those two words out on page 1, and put a period in after "Commission" on line 6 on page 7 and then strike the rest of the language under subsection (8) there? "And that if you are selling your own home...", or is she going to do another amendment to do that?

PRESIDENT: Do you want to stay with what you have as an amendment, Mr. Clerk? It's up to you. Senator Higgins.

SENATOR HIGGINS: For the record, and so that there can be no question later as to legislative intent, it's my understanding that Senator Marsh's amendment will strike on page 1, line 19, "and homeowners", and on page 7, there would be a period on line 6 after the word "Commission" and the rest of subsection (8) will be stricken and I would find that agreeable.
