SENATOR CHAMBERS: What kind of bonds were those, do you remember?

SENATOR GOODRICH: That has been so long ago, Ernie, I can't remember.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Senator Hannibal, do you know what kind of bonds they were? Does anybody from Omaha know? Okay, thank you. Members of the Legislature, a city can issue bonds for street...

PRESIDENT: Just for the record, Senator Chambers, we are now talking on the motion to advance the bill because Senator...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right...can issue bonds to obtain street repair, construction, or whatever. Those bonds have to be retired somehow. The city has to take money to retire those bonds. I presume that the people who live in the city are somehow going to have money taken from them by the city to retire those bonds. So if a bond issue has been issued in Omaha already for street and road repair and an additional tax of one cent on every gallon of gas that a person in Omaha buys, I wonder why they are being hit twice in this
