SENATOR HABERMAN: I don't think so, Senator, because of this reason, they've known since January 1, 1984 that this building was going to be vacant and they have done nothing since then to come up with any facts or anything. They said in there in their opinion it is worth \$130,000. So I see where you are coming from. As far as advancing the bill, once a bill gets on Select File everybody says aye and away it goes. That is where I'm coming from.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Thank you, Rex. Senator Higgins, would you yield to a question, please?

SENATOR HIGGINS: Certainly.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Same question. Since the Douglas County, for example, is obligated to furnish a place for the driver's license examinations, all we are doing in this particular bill is authorizing the department to do something with the building after it gets vacated, we are not setting the price on the building today at all, that is just an indication of what it might be worth.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Have you got a question?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Wait a minute. Now since it is going to be bid, I presume, to the highest bidder, is there anything wrong, in your mind, with advancing the bill today to Select File and we'll give you a copy of that appraisal for your review? But that isn't going to determine the price of the building. What is going to determine the price of the building is what the highest bidder will give for it. It might be \$250,000, who knows. But my thought is we could handle the detail of it between now and Select File. Would that meet with your...or meet your objections?

SENATOR HIGGINS: Senator Goodrich, I appreciate what you are trying to do. What I am trying to do is to force them to get an appraisal on a building that they have known for over six years that June 30th this building will be vacated. Douglas County already has another building that they are putting the State Troopers in for the examinations.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Right.
