"Upon my first visit I found these females suffering from open, festering wounds and other diseases. There were no medical supplies. They had no shoes. Their hair was shorn. The camp was surrounded by barbed wire and closely guarded by SS guards. One could not enter the barracks without being attacked by fleas. I got large boils from them."
