I've tried to point this out to members on committees that I serve on. People don't pay attention to me, as was graphically demonstrated earlier today, but I will survive. This is an object lesson. I don't think the bill, in its original form, has merit. But having defeated the part that was most objectionable to me, since Senator DeCamp now has his bill out here, in trying to be fair, Senator DeCamp, although you torpedoed me in a way that was unconscionable, yes, you did, I'm going to withdraw my kill motion to give him a chance to try to get his bill adopted by the Legislature after the committee that heard it thought it didn't have any merit. I'm withdrawing the kill motion.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Yes. I'd just ask unanimous consent to bracket it indefinitely because it is a good bill, and I'll convince you of it, but I'm just not in the convincing mood today. They are hollering they support it, bracketing.

SENATOR DECAMP: Yes.
