CLERK: (Read the roll call vote as found on pages 2003-04 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: The call is raised.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 17 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The resolution will be reconsidered. Back on the bill. Senator Wesely, are you going to lead off? Or do we...

CLERK: I have a series of amendments. I have amendments.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Oh, we have a series of amendments, I understand, too.

CLERK: Mr. President, the first amendment I have to the resolution...well, the resolution, Mr. President, initially is found on page 1608. The first amendment I have is by Senators Wesely, Scofield and Pappas. That is on page 1891.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you very much for the vote on reconsideration. We appreciate that. On this amendment, and again we will try and be brief to save time. You will find it on page 1891. It is an attempt to clarify what was the intent all along with the resolution but some people felt it needed to be more clearly identified. You will find two clauses that add wording dealing with the fact that we talk about the impact of the nuclear arms race on the ag economy. But Senator Scofield came and made a good point saying, well, not only the ag economy but all our economy is affected by the cost of the nuclear arms buildup. So why don't we expand it to include other things, other economic impacts and public services?
