

Labor Relations Act definition as construed by the National Labor Relations Board as in, for example, NLRB v. Edward G. Budd Manufacturing Company, 169 Fed. 2d page 571, a 1949 case, and NLRB v. St. Francis Hospital of Lynwood, 601 Fed. 2d 404, 1979 case. With those things a matter of record as the basis for adoption of this amendment and the legislative intent of the Legislature, I support the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Wesely, do you wish to close?

We are intending here to deal with the NLRB, trying to follow the National Labor Relations Act in how they try and define supervisor. The cases he identifies, I am sure, are there to make sure anybody who might look at this in the future will know what is to be referenced on the side of the public employers, and I have no idea what they are, but I am sure they are good and just cases and very reasonable, and if that is what Senator DeCamp says, then that is fine.
