

so to bracket the legislation will not, I repeat, will not delay its implementation. The second thing I have to say, is Senator Hoagland, your raising this as being an election issue is bushwah. Now I am up for election next year and I will not be afraid to vote yes or no on this bill next year. You may be, but I won't. Third, this is not, I repeat, is not an action to kill the bill. In fact, I will go so far to stand here in front of this body and say that if somebody tries to kill this bill next year, I will lead the fight not to kill it. This is a fair, equitable motion. There are problems to be ironed out and the only way we can do it is to have more time for these people to sit down and iron these problems out. So all we are asking is this body to be fair. We are not killing the bill. It won't be implemented until January 1 of '86. It will be one of the first bills we are going to get to. So I ask, let's bracket the bill and let the sides try to iron it out and go on from there. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DEKAMP: Well, Mr. President, from what I have been able to learn and observe on this particular bill, I am going to guess that it is probably the single most heavily lobbied bill in terms of number of lobbyists hired and industries or businesses either supporting or opposing, and the net effect of that is I am not sure all the arguments we are going to give on the floor are going to change anything anywhere. In other words, I suspect each senator here has been contacted, not once but several times on this particular motion and you pretty well know what you are going to do one way or the other. As I say, I think of the bills out here this has more organizations either supporting or opposing than any single bill in the Legislature. So there is no question you have all been contacted repeatedly. If anybody hasn't, let me know. So I think we ought to just vote one way or the other. Either they have got the votes or they don't and I suspect it is a couple one way or the other or maybe one or two one way or the other. Just let's vote on it.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Vard Johnson.
