Everyone has judgments filed against them. Everyone will have to pay prejudgment and postjudgment if this bill passes. I would urge the body to reject the Hoagland and Johnson amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER NICHOL: I have several lights on and I am not sure which ones wish to speak to the Johnson amendment. May I see your hands, please, if you do wish to. Senator Hoagland. Okay, the first one of those is Senator Haberman, then Senator Hoagland, Senator Johnson...no, Senator Higgins, then Senator Johnson.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Hall, shame on you for using my "shame on you" remarks. I don't think that is quite right but that is all right. And, Senator Johnson, that is twice you have had the shame on you this year. I hope it doesn't happen again. Members of the body, this proves why we should bracket this bill because it is getting so confusing now. I would like to ask some member outside of the Omaha delegation to get up and explain to me and the rest of the body just exactly what the bill contains and where it is going. When you can't even get the Omaha delegation to agree, then there must be something that is wrong somewhere. So, therefore, we have a choice. Do we support the intelligent, astute, heart of hearts Senator Vard Johnson from Omaha, or do we support the young, intelligent, handsome, future political figure of Nebraska, Senator Hall?
