

SENATOR MARSH: It is temporarily withdrawn.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Lynch would move to reconsider the vote on adoption of Senator Haberman's amendment to the bill.

SENATOR MARSH: Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Madam President and members, I hate to admit it but I think I made a mistake. Oh, yes, I did. I voted in favor of Senator Haberman's amendment. During committee we discussed it. And I hate to suggest doing this to my good friend, Senator Haberman, but I think in the best interest of the bill, which primarily was introduced to help develop a set of standards so that when people move houses it can be accomplished without violating the law and I think at the present time the bill is amended to the point where it probably may not pass, first of all, but, secondly, does not meet, I think, the need and intent for which it was intended. I would respectfully submit that even in the plumbing business I know in a three-quarter ton truck you get two bathtubs and two johns, you're in trouble. You know you take off one of the bathtubs or both johns, you might be able to make it down the road without overloading. I'm not quite sure how far we should go and can go in violating those standards or being caught in the process of it. I'm not sure if we should continue to interpret the law and make it easier for us to violate those laws. Also, even though the county officials across the state didn't formally discuss this with me, as you all know, most of the bridges in this state are in serious trouble. Overloading would even cause then further damage to some of the highways and especially bridges which I am sure we do not have the money to repair. So, with deep respect to Senator Haberman and regretting having to do this, I would respectfully submit that I think we should reconsider our vote on Senator Haberman's amendment to this legislation.
