SENATOR LAMB: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR MARSH: Senator Rod Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Madam Chairperson, members of the Legislature, I concur with what Senator Haberman has already said. This bill is a priority bill of the Agriculture Committee. It is also very important to the Public Service Commission, which regulates these grain buyers in the state as well as our grain warehouses and elevators. I have talked with Mr. Rasmussen from the Public Service Commission. He is in agreement with the amendment, feels that it is a fair and worthwhile amendment. The bill, as a whole, I would just urge you is very important and I think one that is very necessary for the grain warehouse industry in this state. I would ask you to support Senator Haberman's motion along these lines.

SENATOR MARSH: Senator Sieck.

SENATOR SIECK: Madam Chairperson, I, too, want to support the amendment. This all came about because of the situation up at Rosalie, Nebraska where an individual actually stole a bunch of grain. He wasn't really considered a storage, he didn't have a license yet. He stored it over ten days. This is to take care of situations like this where an individual can...will be required to get a license after ten days if he is storing grain and if the individual did not get his money for the grain. That is the purpose of the amendment. I'll endorse it. Thank you.

SENATOR MARSH: Senator Chronister.

SENATOR CHRONISTER: Madam Chairman, I just wanted to bring up the point that Senator Sieck mentioned in regard to Rosalie. It is a much needed amendment. I urge you all to vote for it. Thank you.

SENATOR MARSH: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I'll waive closing.

SENATOR MARSH: We are now ready to vote on the amendment. Those in favor vote aye, opposed no. It takes 25 votes.
