SENATOR HOAGLAND: Let me temporarily withdraw that amendment, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is withdrawn. Next, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion I have is a motion by the Speaker. The Speaker would move to suspend Rule 6, Section 3, Rule 7, Section 3, and vote without further debate or amendment on LB 105.

PRESIDENT: I think that is Senator Johnson's motion.

CLERK: Sorry, you are absolutely right, Mr. Speaker. Senator Johnson moves to suspend the rules.

PRESIDENT: Senator Johnson, go ahead.

SENATOR L. JOHNSON: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, the time is drawing near. I think we have discussed many of the elements of the bill. There is a report on your desk that I would like to call your attention to which definitely countermands the many words expressed here about adversarial roles of parents.
