It is just to crack down on drinking on the highway and you must remember that you are a little pixilated even if you are only .105, .05, in other words, and legally you are drunk when you have got .10, but you can already feel your reactions aren't near as good after you have a few beers. What we would like to do is get rid of it so that we have safer highways. So I urge you to vote for this amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: We are on the committee amendments. Senator DeCamp, did you wish to talk about the committee amendments?

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, some times you get started kind of slow in the afternoon and you don't get all your gears working right, but as I understand it, just reading the committee amendments, they weren't just the worst before Harold's amendment, which we just adopted. And as I understand the original committee amendments, and it is now my understanding that Senator Conway was deeply involved in the draftsmanship of that or the ideas. Is that right, Senator Conway? He thinks so. It is like some other things I have asked him about, he doesn't always give a complete answer. But anyway, I would like to ask Senator Conway a question then about the committee amendments. Senator Conway, under the original committee amendments which I am holding in my hand which I obtained from you, under the original committee amendments if you had the RV going down the highway and you were...you had my two guys playing Old Maid in the back like I was describing, and they had a Coors and they were going on a cross-country trip of 200 or 400 miles or whatever, or coming to the football game, as long as that was way out of range of the driver, they could, as I understand it from reading your amendments, they could have sat there and drank their Coors. Is that correct?
