I think this bill deserves...it has had a discussion, I think it deserves to get the treatment it ought to have and we had ought to be honest and recognize there are some things that maybe this Legislature had ought to just stay out of. Now I recognize that Senator Sieck is sincere. I recognize that Senator Sieck says, you know, we really can't enforce all of that.

SPEAKER NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR VICKERS: And that is probably true. And maybe it is because we have got an unenforceable statute already. Making it even more unenforceable is not going to solve the problem. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Hoagland, then Senator Haberman, then Senator Labeledz. Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I would just like to speak briefly in opposition to the motion to indefinitely postpone this bill. You know, I think it is possible for us all afternoon to discuss hypotheticals. Any bill that we write, someone can put together horror story-type hypotheticals. We can talk about the man on the lawn mower drinking a can of beer or we can talk about somebody with a bottle of whiskey in the glove compartment, but I think we all know that police officers in 999 cases out of a 1000 are not going to prosecute that kind of case, that the kind of activity this bill was addressed to is the kind of activity many, many of us are familiar with and it is the problem of people driving up and down the streets, usually at night, drinking, maybe throwing their cans out the window, the kind of ordinary conduct that we see throughout the state, not the kind of hypotheticals that
