

is a point at which the Department of Revenue has to say, okay, here are the standards that we will establish for this, and the public actually making the filings can say, okay, this is what we have to live by. So, consequently, we have a starting point at which the Department of Revenue then must say, okay, now we've got to get down to business and make a ruling on this. I'm just trying to clear it up as to when a complete filing is made and consequently giving the Department of Revenue a point at which they must then make their ruling within 60 days of that, which is the Conway amendment.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Thank you, Senator Goodrich.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Were you through, Senator Hannibal? Okay. Senator Goodrich, now close, please.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay, Mr. President, members of the body, Senator Johnson said in essence that this was an insignificant amendment. If it will make the legislation clearer to the general public that has to live with it, and even to the Department of Revenue that has to live with it, why not do it? There is no intention to delay this bill. There is no way a person could delay this bill if you didn't put a kill motion on it or something like that. So I would suggest that we go ahead and make it clearer so that the public can live with...know what they have to live with. The Department of Revenue has the same ground rules that they establish by rules and regs, and we're making it clear for everybody. I would ask your return of the bill for the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is, shall the bill be returned? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Three are excused. Have you all voted that care to? Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: I think if we just wait a couple of minutes, we'll get a couple more votes here. I hate to delay the darn thing.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Well, we better do something.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Well, we better have a roll call vote then.
