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than I needed to be. But at this point, like I say, I have made the commitments that I would hold it up and give them a chance to plead their case to attach it and if they win, they win. If they lose, they lose.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is, shall the bill be passed over? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. It takes 25 votes. Have you all voted? If you care to vote, please do so. Two are excused. Senator Conway.

SENATOR CONWAY: Could we have a check in. There we have 25.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Record Mr. Clerk. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Roll call vote.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Roll call vote has been asked for. Okay.

CLERK: (Roll call vote begun.)

SENATOR CONWAY: Can I request check in first?

SPEAKER NICHOL: Please check your green buttons to show that you are here. Look up to see if your green button is lit. Senator Hefner, Senator Hoagland, Senator Labedz. Senator Landis. We're looking for Senator Hefner. There is going to be a roll call vote on the motion to pass over the bill. I guess we're all here now. We're voting on the passing over of the bill. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 2274-75 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I have a question, Mr. Chairman.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Beutler, I hope you don't mind me raising the issue, but it is something that maybe ought to be considered. This would not consist of changing the Speaker's order? If the Speaker set a bill to be heard and the bill...the body votes not to do what the Speaker's order said would be done, isn't that a vote to change the Speaker's order? Let me phrase the question in a neutral way. Is that a vote to change the Speaker's order?

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
